






News from Kim & Steph

FROM THE AGED & COMMUNITY SERVICES AUSTRALIA



ACSA participated in the Aged Care COVID-19 Preparedness Forum held in Canberra on Friday 6 March. The Forum was hosted by the Australian Government Chief Medical Officer, Professor Brendan Murphy and the Minister for Senior Australians and Aged Care, Senator the Hon. Richard Colbeck with the Aged Care Quality and Safety Commissioner Janet Anderson attending.

Collaboration between the Commonwealth, the aged care sector, state and territory public health authorities, and the healthcare sector is a key part of COVID-19 planning and preparedness activity.

The key points from the meeting were:

- The Government acknowledged that support would be needed for the aged care sector and that working together was critical.
- The Government is acutely aware of issues with access to personal protective equipment and has said it will ensure availability for aged care services. The Government is also looking at supply chain issues with consumables including medicines.
- The Communicable Diseases Network Australia (CDNA) is developing guidelines on COVID- 19 specifically for residential aged care which will be based on existing influenza guidelines but will be different as no vaccine is currently available for COVID-19.
- People diagnosed with COVID-19 are currently being treated and isolated in hospital even if
 they are reasonably well. With a community outbreak it is expected that people in
 residential aged care with mild symptoms will be looked after in isolation in their residential
 aged care home. The meeting highlighted evidence that with the right protective gear and
 infection control protocols workers should not contract the virus.
- Aged care providers need to review and test their infection control plans, disaster plans and business continuity plans; to check that assumptions in plans are still current; and to make sure that staff understand their responsibilities and what they need to do. In addition, they should maintain infection control protocols and activate a COVID-19 Emergency Response Plan.
- Aged care providers should work collaboratively with their local public health unit.

COVID-19 UPDATE

As you would be aware from the previous correspondence to all residents, representatives and staff, we are being proactive in minimising the risk of Coronavirus by closely following the advise from the World Health Organisation and Australian Department of Health published information. We thank everyone for your over whelming support, understanding and co-operation.

HOME CONTINUOUS IMPROVEMENT UPDATE

Buffet Breakfast renovations commenced on Wednesday (19th) & Thursday (20th) March.
This will allow for greater choice for residents at meal times. The Leadership team will then
consult with residents and staff to create new procedures and develop education that will
increase flexibility and choice for our residents.

HOME CONTINUOUS IMPROVEMENT UPDATE CONTINUED

- Residents are encouraged to share their favourite recipes with our catering staff, in an effort to implement family favourites onto our lunch and dinner menus.
- Residents, Staff and Visitors are encouraged to submit ideas for Tanunda Lutheran Home's Christmas Float for 2020.
- The ladies Auxiliary are creating clothes protectors for residents to protect their clothing during meals. These were shown to the Resident Collaboration Committee who were loved the newly designed protectors that will increase Resident Dignity.
- Training sessions for Manual Handling and Fire Training have been booked in for staff, as well as new online training courses.






Flu Vaccine Requirements



To all Residents, Family Members, Representatives and Volunteers,

In these trying times I'm sure you are all suffering the information overload and changes to what were our normal daily activities. The whole COVID-19 pandemic has caused a greater level of change that will now effect those who visit an aged care facility.

It is now a requirement stipulated by government authority that ALL visitors must have been inoculated for this year's flu season. If you are attending the aged care facility and can't show proof that you have received the latest flu inoculation will not be allowed to enter the facility.

At Tanunda Lutheran Home we will maintain our lockdown procedures for some time. It will be expected as you enter the Home you will produce a document from your doctor with evidence of having received an inoculation for this year's flu season. A photocopy of the document will be taken and a register will be maintained of your details so as you do not need to have the document every time you visit. This information needs to be shared with all family members who may wish to visit the Home in the future.

I ask you all to assist us to again maintain the health and wellbeing of the residents and staff by complying with this new government stipulation. On behalf of the Board Members and Executive Management team of Tanunda Lutheran Home Inc, please be advised of the following actions being taken:

- Tanunda Lutheran Home has updated the Infection Control.
- Policies & Procedures to reflect the changes in regard the Flu Vaccine.
- Staff are aware of how to care for residents in all types of infectious outbreaks including Flu
 epidemics.
- Signage has been placed at all entries to provide you with further information regarding the requirement for flu inoculations.
- The door closures will remain in force until further notice and advice from the authorities.
- If no evidence of having a Flu Vaccination after the 1 May 2020 you or any member of the family will be refused entry to the Home.
- Assistance from the local police will be asked if failure to leave the area when asked by staff.

If you require further clarification of this situation please contact 8563 7777, your call will be referred to a nominated staff member.

MEET .. Alan Hall ..



This month TIT TAT has made the long trip to TRL "suburbia" - to Alf Pellegrini Drive - to have a chat to Alan Hall. When asked if he would share something of his life with readers, he readily agreed - with the comment, "I have been thinking for quite some time that I should write down something about my life, and just haven't gotten around to it - I must get started!" Alan has spent a busy few days at his computer and here is a little about his full and interesting life!



Alan was born in 1932 at Brighton, SA, one of three children of his parents Jim and Jean Hall. They lived in a small house sitting on top of a sandhill on the Brighton Esplanade. The sea was less than 50 metres from their front fence at high tide. He has many happy memories of playing amongst the sandhills and going fishing - he remembers catching his first fish - a reasonably-sized mullet when he was 5 or 6 years old. The family house was often exposed to quite severe storms during winter. Alan says that in a bad storm in 1948 their house lost its roof, but he apparently slept through that, waking up only when water started dripping on him.

Alan went to a couple of private primary schools - one in Brighton, and the other at Somerton which involved him riding his bike 4 or 5 kms. through the grounds of Minda Home. When he was just 10 years-old, his parents decided to send him to Prince Alfred College. Attending PAC meant walking to the Hove Railway Station, taking a train to Adelaide, and then a bus to the college - he did this for 8 years. He remembers his time at PAC mainly for playing sport. He recalls enjoying English and Maths, tolerating French and Latin, but never embracing Physics or Chemistry with any enthusiasm.

After finishing at PAC, Alan decided to train for a teaching career at the Teachers College on Kintore Avenue. After 2 years at Teachers College and Adelaide University he was appointed in 1953 to the one-teacher school at Galga which had 12 students. In 1954 the enrolment at Galga doubled when the neighbouring school at Mercunda closed. In 1957 Alan was transferred to Lucindale Higher Primary School, and then in 1960 he moved to Yankalilla Area School.

Alan says that the best part of his time at Yankalilla was becoming friendly with Joy Nordback who was teaching Years 1 and 2. Joy agreed to marry Alan - they were married in the Methodist Church in Torrens Park in January, 1963. They had a honeymoon trip in Victoria on their way to Loveday, where they had both been appointed to the local primary school. Joy had more than 30 children in Years 1 - 3 and Alan had about 40 students in Years 4 - 7. They were kept busy!

After a year at Loveday, Alan was appointed as Deputy Principal at Lucindale - so it was back to familiar territory. Joy had retired from teaching as she and Alan prepared to raise a family

They had two children born in Naracoorte - Gillian (1964) and Tim (1966), and later Phillip (1968). In 1967 Alan and Joy, and their two elder children moved to Oakbank, where Alan served as Deputy Principal of the Oakbank Area School for two years, then Acting Principal in a third year.

In 1969 Alan became Principal of the Moonta Primary School where he served for 3 years. Alan says that Moonta was a great spot for someone who grew up with a love for fishing. In Moonta he acquired a boat that was big enough to take him out to serious fishing grounds, and he and Joy were able to purchase a 'little old house' which the family later used as a destination of choice during school holidays.

A few days before the end of his final year at Moonta, Alan received a 'phone call from an Education Department staffing officer offering him the position of Principal at a school in Darwin and he and Joy had just a couple of hours to make a decision - so after a few enquiries about the school they decided to go.

They lived and worked in Darwin for 2 years, during which time they enjoyed some special experiences that they would never have had if they had remained in South Australia. They did some wonderful trips while in Darwin. Alan recalls an occasion when he and a friend went fishing in Kakadu, when their boat ran out of fuel. With darkness descending they scrambled onto a small island, which they later discovered they shared with a couple of crocodiles. Joy and the children were back at the camp worrying about why Alan and his friend were not returning. They alerted some men camping nearby, who set off looking for the lost fisherman - found them and towed them back to camp. While still in Darwin they went on a trip to South East Asia and were away when Cyclone Tracey demolished Darwin.

Following Darwin, Alan had the choice to come back to South Australia and was offered schools in Berri, Mannum or Nuriootpa - he never had any regrets about choosing Nuriootpa, where he served as Principal for 17 years. He had one year in the old primary school, and then in 1975 moved to the innovative new school building on the present site at Buna Terrace. Alan retired aged 58 in 1991.

Sport has been a significant part of Alan's life. He developed a love of cricket inspired by the achievements of Don Bradman. A specialist sport teaching at Prince Alfred College developed Alan's interest in cricket, football, high jumping and distance running - he says that his academic progress suffered while his sporting interests flourished!

During his teaching career Alan played football and cricket for Galga, Lucindale, Yankalilla and Bamera Monash. When faulty knees forced him out of football he concentrated on cricket, playing at Oakbank, Moonta, in Darwin and for Nuriootpa. He tried a few years of golf but found he had no talent for the game, so he began to play lawn bowls at Angaston and has enjoyed 34 years with the club.



Alan and Joy moved from Angaston to Alf Pellegrini Drive in October 2013 - Joy wanted to move from hilly Angaston, so they both happily chose to live at Alf Pellegrini Drive. Sadly Joy passed away in September, 2018. The people at Alf Pellegrini Drive describe Alan as a wonderful person who is caring, friendly and welcoming. Thanks for sharing your story, Alan!


These items will be distributed either on an individual or small group bases and shared amongst the residents.


