As mentioned in my Tit Tat article last month - winter is upon us - little did I know at the time it would be so wet and so very cold so quickly. I do hope you are all staying warm and dry. Locals are telling me that we need the rain to ensure a good year in 2017. The Barossa Valley is a pretty picture now with the new growth of the various crops.

Did you have the opportunity to see the Police Band when they visited the home. Thank you to Rachel Fritz and her staff for the work behind the scenes to make it happen. There was a very good turnout for both concerts. Please remember if you do know of some good entertainment that is affordable or free let Rachel and her staff know so we can organise them to visit.

It has been nice to see the newly appointed staff have all settled into their new roles and getting on with the job of looking after everyone. Thank you to everyone for making them welcome and assisting in ensuring we continue to provide great care and support.

The facility was fortunate to gain the support from the Federal Electoral Commission in providing the Mobile Voting Booth service. A number of residents took the opportunity to attend and vote early. This is planned to be a common service to be provided in the future - thank you to Ann O'Donnell for organising the mobile voting booth service. Please ensure you check the mail and noticeboards for notification of any visiting services to the facility.

The current Federal election promises are coming thick and fast - one wanting a parliament enquiry in to the funding of aged care and another stating it will spend \$52 million on teaching senior citizens how to use mobile phones and other technology to communicate with family and stay in contact. The funding of aged care remains the greatest issue for the industry - with the CPI increases and reduction of funding there is a growing need to establish new services and other ways of raising funding to continue to provide residential care and support to those who need it.

With pleasure it is announced that France Nesci Homes have been selected as the preferred Builder for the 25 Bridge Street project. Three Tenders were received and reviewed. It is hoped the construction work to build three units commences soon. If you know someone who may want to reside in the units please refer them to Carolyn Redden.

Due to the wet weather the work on the Langmeil site has been delayed. Planning has commenced on the Nuriootpa site with a good attendance at the first planning meeting. Construction at the 120 Menge Road site remains on track. Refurbishment works in ABG are continuing with the remodelled kitchenette nearing completion.

We continue to farewell staff and welcome new staff and volunteers. We hope all the new residents are settling in and feeling comfortable - if you have any ideas on how to improve things please let us know. Go the Crows - what a game they had on Thursday last week.


Beloved mother of Cecilie Noack— TLH Volunteer


Walter and Hilda Randall What an amazing milestone!

Profile

Robert (Neville) Alderslade OAM —Gifted Musician



Most people know Neville, or have heard of him, because of his service to the community through music. He has been a prominent bandsman here in the Barossa for many years and in fact has generously contributed his time and talents for most of his life wherever he happened to be living. Here at Tanunda Lutheran Home, Neville is well known at Barossa Club, in the Chapel on Sundays accompanying hymns on his trumpet, and is often seen getting around the property on his red gopher. Here is Neville's story.


Neville entered the world in 1934 at Bendigo, Victoria, fourth child of Ernest (a Welshman) and Barbara (Scottish). Ernest was blessed with a good singing voice. He served as a soldier in the Welsh Guard and fought at Gallipoli in WW1. Though gassed in the horrific warfare, he survived, but suffered throughout life as a result of injuries. In 1927 Ernest migrated to Australia ahead of Barbara, as he was offered employment in Queensland as a galvaniser. Unfortunately, there was no work available after all—they were hard economic times—so they were forced to move to Victoria in search of employment. The couple ended up in Bendigo where Neville was born. His father obtained a job as green keeper, then with the Australian Army. Ernest was too old to be sent overseas but as Warrant Officer 2, served in Medical Supplies.

There were three boys and two girls in the family. Neville's schooling up to Year 8 was at Bendigo, Melbourne and Rosebud. Due to distance and war time petrol rationing, Neville was unable to continue with secondary education. He well remembers the joyous day peace was announced; he vigorously pulled the school bell and broke the rope!

Neville's first job was painting houses at Rosebud and it wasn't long before he joined the local Preston Band which was then the top A Grade band. His brother Jack, born in Scotland, was a good tuba player. Their father bought an old cornet and Jack taught Neville to play this instrument, but only in the C major scale. These were the only lessons Neville ever had—the rest was by trial and error! "From the seat of our pants, we learned to play," Neville says. His mother was an accomplished pianist, so, born of a musical family, Neville soon became an expert trumpeter and his whole life revolved around music. When living in Mildura, Neville joined the Band there, also the Symphony Orchestra.



It so happened that the Mildura Band arranged a long weekend trip to Broken Hill, staying at the Grand Hotel. Little did Neville realise this trip was to change his life for the better and bring much happiness. A gorgeous young waitress, Edna Johns, was working at this hotel. Neville was quick off the mark and beat his young fellow musicians to chat up this young lady. As a result, the enterprising would-be suitor took Edna to the Saturday night



at the hotel early next morning so Neville walked her home from the bus stop in Argent Street. Edna kissed him goodnight—and Neville never remembered walking back to the hotel! He wrote her a letter every day from Mildura where he was a painter in the railways. He drove a Singer sports car and visited Edna once a month. Neville still has the crystal wine glasses he gave Edna for her 21st birthday. They were married in the Presbyterian church in Mildura at the time of the record 1956 flood.

Neville's mother was listening to the Sunday Morning Band Parade radio program in Mildura and was impressed by the high standard of the Tanunda Town Band on air. She promptly wrote to the Band asking them if they would like two good players—Neville and his brother Ernie —so Neville joined the TTB in 1957 and the rest is history! Moving to Tanunda, the family joined the Tabor Lutheran Congregation and Neville was christened as an adult. Neville insists that Edna became his biggest supporter—every award he had "was really Edna's."

Neville and Edna travelled all over the world with the TTB to Toyko, New Zealand, Singapore, Hong Kong, Malaysia, Penang. Some were trade delegations financed by the government. The time came when Neville was due for early retirement. He was a distiller and painter at Seppeltsfield and was also restoring old buggies and historical equipment. This is where Neville learned to converse in the German language—he is blessed with a retentive memory. He had contracted polio as a boy prior to starting school and believes

treatment from Sister Kenny by way of manipulation and exercise improved his condition. But the pain returned some 20 or 30 years later. He also has had hearing difficulties all his life. In spite of these setbacks, Neville persisted and became a skilled musician, playing soprano cornet in the Tanunda Town Band, 3rd trumpeter for Adelaide Symphony Orchestra, teaching youngsters and conducting the Junior Tanunda Band. Neville was always passionate about training the youngsters to a high level of competence, and regards this as his main calling in sharing his musical gifts. He claims those young people made him a far better musician—it was his biggest thrill to teach them as they were keen to master and improve their talents. He was asked to play at one or even two weddings most Saturdays and cheerfully obliged without charging a fee—it was his contribution to music. He was awarded the Most Improved Bandsman of the Year as well as being recipient of the Order of Australia Citizen of the Year for Service to the Community through Music. He is Life Member of the Marananga and Tanunda Brass Bands, Band Master of the Marananga Band and was President of the Band Contest Committee. Neville has been a member of TTB for 40 years and Musical Director for 14 years—an amazing achievement. His three sons have played in the Tanunda Town Band and Gordon is still a bandsman.

Neville joined the Army part time - as a Sergeant in the CMF Band (Citizens' Military Force) driving each week to headquarters at Elizabeth. The Band travelled to Melbourne and Neville completed a Band Masters' course. He became a Warrant Officer Band Master. He is grateful for his retentive memory. Now this is hard to believe, but Neville has a newspaper cutting showing him sitting on an old 1951 Mercedes Benz and playing *Post Horn Gallop* on his fully operational .303 rifle! It was part of a fund raiser in Perth for the Variety Club that supports underprivileged and handicapped children.

Neville claims he can even get a recognisable tune out of a garden hose!

With Edna's health declining, Neville and Edna moved to an IL unit in Hilda Schulz Drive back in March 2015. Sadly Edna died later that year. Even though Neville misses Edna very much, he loves living here—he likes spending time at the Barossa Club and enjoys his daily meals cooked in the TLH kitchen. Although he thinks he doesn't play the trumpet well for Chapel, he says that he enjoys accompanying each of the eight excellent organists at services —and of course sharing his special gifts is very much appreciated by the congregation. "It's been a great life," Neville says.





INDEPENDENT LIVING SOCIAL MORNING Thursday 16th June 2016

Following socialising over morning tea, a receptive audience was thrilled by the expertise and sound of the talented SA Police Band, considered the best professional band in Australia. Tom Pulford, soprano saxophonist, introduced each player and explained the function, range, pitch and key of each instrument. Tom also discussed the talented arrangers and background of many of the tunes they played. The brilliant percussionist is one of the best in Australia.

Much planning is necessary behind the scenes prior to a Military Tattoo-any special event could take three to six months of planning and rehearsals. The highly rated band has travelled extensively overseas and were recently honoured to play in Edinburgh for the 90th birthday celebrations for HRH Queen Elizabeth. When in "Windy" Wellington, New Zealand their pith helmets were blown off by the strong winds for which Wellington is famous. The range of tunes was very well received and much enjoyed. One such tune was Martha my dear written by Paul McCartney for his dog! George Gerschwin's masterpieces were featured— Fascinating Rhythm and Nice work if you can get it. 
