

In today's aged care and retirement industry it is necessary for us to compete for more business. We acknowledge we have some old buildings that do not look as good as some of the newer facilities on offer in other locations. We have our Gramp building that provides space - this is the envy of many other places. Over the coming years the 30 Year Vision will become reality. With a new aged care facility, retirement apartments, improved social spaces and improved systems, life will be different and exciting. It is the wish of the Board and supported by staff that we continue to provide a Christian supported environment and ensure access to Resident Centred Care.

Should you have any feedback about the process please feel free to let me know. If there are questions as to what is happening please ask for an answer - better to hear the correct message than react to rumours. There are feedback forms available throughout the facility.

Project Updates

Menge Road project will be completed in November 2016 - sales of the houses have been excellent. Construction work continues to be on time.

The Langmeil Road project—Clearing of the site is nearing completion - if the weather holds the clearing will be completed. Planning for the replacement houses will begin soon.

Planning for the **Nuriootpa site in Schaedel Street** continues with final plans being established for Board Member consideration. It is planned to have a Development Application to the Barossa Council in the near future.

Commencement of work on the **25 Bridge Street** site occurred a couple of weeks ago. A finish date of February / March 2017 is expected. All units are sold.

The **27 Bridge Street Master Planning process** is nearing completion - in the next weeks a final plan will be ready for approval by the Board Members. If you know of a local community group who would like me to present the plan to them please let me know. Happy to attend any location any time to spread the word of the 30 Year Vision.

We continue to farewell staff and welcome new staff and volunteers. We hope all the new residents are settling in and feeling comfortable - if you have any ideas on how to improve things please let us know.

PHILIPP and ZAZILIA MAY Independent Living



Life brings unexpected twists and turns—and as a result, new IL residents Philipp and Zazilia are grateful for the abundant life they have enjoyed since becoming naturalised Aussies.

Philipp, according to his car numberplate, was born in 1933 in faraway Yugoslavia, while Zazilia's birthplace in 1934 was Austria. Their delightful accents reveal that they did not always call Australia home.

Folk in Philipp's home town were of German origin, very similar to that of Tanunda a hundred years ago. These people were immigrants, forced to flee from Yugoslavia during the war years almost 200 years ago, resulting in this German speaking enclave where Philipp grew up. He had only four years of schooling and had to leave at the age of 11, then had one year in an Austrian school. Though he had a good understanding of Yugoslav, Philipp's first language was German.

During the difficult years of WWII the Yugoslav government wanted to get rid of these German migrants, as they were not naturalised. They were given two choices—leave, or get shot. As a result, the people were granted emergency housing in German schools. Some employment was gained with the local farmers who offered them accommodation. In time, families were forced to leave their homeland for countries all over the world - the United States, Canada, England, or Australia. So many people were separated for life from their relatives.

At the age of 16, Philipp obtained a trade apprenticeship with a blacksmith in Austria—he learned to shoe horses and build wagons and trays for trucks. Later Philipp worked at an Autohaus at Enns, owned by the Ollinger family—with whom the Mays still keep in contact. It just happened that Zazilia also worked there, then after about two years she moved on to a job in a jewellery factory. This was the beginning of their romance, followed by marriage and a year later, their migration to Australia.

Zazilia was born in 1934 in Austria, an only child. Sadly, her father died when Zazilia was six or seven years of age. After her mother remarried, Zazilia was pleased to, in time, welcome a step sister and step brother. Some years later Zazilia's mother also died, at the time when Philipp and Zazilia were planning their wedding. The practice at the time decreed that a bride was to wear not the usual white gown, but out of respect, a dark colour instead during the customary mourning period. These days, Zazilia is pleased to have her step sister and children now living locally.

It was in 1956 that, with their family of two girls and two boys, they left Europe for an uncle's farm at Dutton to begin a new life in South Australia. It was fortunate that this was a German speaking community which



made the transition much easier and helped to assimilate them into their newly adopted country. When they had found their feet after six months or so, Philipp obtained a job in the Tanunda workshop of the Mickan family, and being in contact with the public, was able to master the English language quite soon. Another employee was able to translate for Philipp if necessary. The Mays lived in rental accommodation for about six years before building their home in Pioneer Avenue, Tanunda.

Unfortunately one of their sons was to lose his life in an accident at the tender age of eight. Their three children live locally and Philipp and Zazilia are proud of their six grandchildren and avidly follow their football games.

Emily lovingly cares for him, feeding him with a bottle of special milk every four hours.

Fidgit, though a pretty grey colour, is actually a Red kangaroo and will eventually go to live in a wildlife sanctuary.

But I soon had lots of girl friends, when I played billiards in a pub, Mates still got and had their wounds fixed, at the local footy club. It took some years to change them; a few had knee joints changed, Playing, until they got dumped; I called it 'contact sports deranged'. My changes now seemed not too crazy; perhaps sensibly inspired, Without contact sports I still play games, although I'm now retired. I now like whist and contract bridge; I always did like taking tricks, And if billiards ever gets too much, cues are perfect walking sticks.
