Chaplain's Reflection

Since the last Tit Tat we've seen the <u>Four Corners</u> episodes featuring stories of abuse in aged care facilities, even facilities that have ticked all their accreditation standards. It's certainly making people think and making people ask again. "I <u>think</u> the care at TLH is good, and they <u>did</u> pass all their standards. But I might just take a bit more Interest in Mum or Dad's care for a while." I'll certainly be doing that with my own Dad who lives in a care facility.

The new standards, which are about to come in, place "Dignity and Consumer Choice" at the very centre. "Dignity" is all about treating the resident with honour and respect for who they are, and believing that there is something very special about this person. Special residents interacting with special staff. Treating somebody with dignity naturally then implies that the residents will have plenty of choices in how they live their lives, even down to quite specific details.

All of the bad stories of aged care have the common theme. The resident is not being treated with dignity. Standards of care don't change very often. We've had the current ones for 20 something years. They were written when nursing homes were a bit like old-style hospitals where the staff set all the rules. So 'dignity' could fall through the cracks. The new standards reflect the latest ideas of what nursing care in a home-like environment should be about. It'll be exciting to see the changes happen.

If aged care is sometimes a bit of a continuous study of power versus powerlessness for people, I'm about to face my own study of power vs powerlessness: attending a national Lutheran synodical convention in Sydney. Some people love synods. Some people are good at making a persuasive argument in front of 400 leaders of the church. But others feel that bad things happen completely outside their control, and they wonder why they bother to attend.

This is why a lot of prayer goes into the preparation for Synod, so those who 'win' don't get too triumphant, and those who 'lose' feel that God still loves them, and that in the back-to-front way that Christ works in this world, the last may actually be the first. So we don't pray for specific outcomes too much at these events. But we do pray that our spiritual life and journey may be enhanced as we participate in the process and seek to serve even those we might see as opponents.

This synod will decide whether the Lutheran church in Australia/New Zealand will have female pastors going forward. I invite your prayers around this subject — prayer that goodwill can flourish in the way business is conducted, how we talk to each other, and through the outcomes. The service wings of the church, like aged care, can model the kind of dignified approach which can make this synod great. I'll give a report next Tit Tat. Blessings to you all.



It is now official – Tanunda Lutheran Home meets all 44 outcomes of the four aged care Quality Standards we are very proud to have achieved this. Thank you to all those involved. It was a team effort involving all levels of staff, residents and families. As the lift out in *The Leader* on 20th September states, "A job well done". I hope you all enjoyed the articles and pictures provided in the paper. The main focus over the coming months is to educate everyone in the new Aged Care Quality Standards. There are now eight Standards all very customer focused. Please attend information sessions when advertised and become involved in the discussions of how as a team working together we can make Tanunda Lutheran Home the place to be – now and into the future. Change will be inevitable but if we are all involved in the changes we will be able to support each other in the process. Feel free to speak up, use the Compliments, Complaints and Suggestions forms that are located throughout the Home.

With the announcement of the Royal Commission in to the Aged Care industry this week Tanunda Lutheran Home would like to indicate our total support to the process. The recommendations may not be known until later in 2019 but many changes are already occurring to ensure the industry improves care and services whilst meeting all regulations. From the Board Members, Executive Team and all staff we will ensure there will be continued improvement in what we do to meet the needs of our residents and their families.

Please go to our web site home page to see information regarding the aged care industry. This will be updated as the Royal Commission information comes to hand. If you have any questions please ask we want everyone to be informed. If you have any queries in regard to media reports, I am more than happy to try and explain the reasons behind the articles. Please be aware that there is some incorrect information used in the media.

During the past week we have had the "validators" here reviewing our documentation to justify our funding that pays for the care we supply. A big thank you to the Aged Care Funding Instrument (ACFI) girls who work tirelessly to ensure the assessment and documentation is completed in a timely fashion ensuring we gain the funding we are entitled to. Staff receive training in the importance of ensuring that documentation is reflective of the day to day care given to residents. The outcome of the review will be known in a couple of weeks' time.

I am pleased to announce following a review process that Belmore Nurses agency has been appointed as our exclusive nursing agency. This means that a more stable workforce will be engaged and over a period of time more permanent staff engaged on the roster. We look forward to developing the partnership over the coming months.

The project in Nuriootpa is moving along – the actual building works may commence in October 2018. Expressions of interest in purchasing a new property continues to increase, if you know anyone interested in joining the retirement village family please refer them to Carolyn Redden. The planning documentation is nearing completion for the Langmeil Road project.

Welcome to all new residents and their families in the facility and the Independent Retirement Living units. If there is anything we can do to make things better please let us know by completing a Feedback form readily available.



ANDREW and SALLY PEARCE Independent Retirement Living



In ten years, it is estimated that 18% of the population will be 65 years and over (5.2 million people) and 2.3% will be 85 years and over (672,000 people). Entry to residential aged care is 82 years for men and 84.6 years for women.



- A delicious two course lunch meal prepared by the wonderful TLH Catering Team is available to enjoy in Barossa Club and the cost is \$7.00.
- A bus service for pick up and drop off to your door if you live in Tanunda, Angaston or Nuriootpa is available for \$5.80 (Concession Rate).

Invictus Games Sydney - 20/27th October


Invictus Games 2018 will attract competitors from 18 nations who will compete in 11 adaptive sports events.

Invicta (motto) Invicta (meaning "undefeated" or "unconquered") was used in Rome - - invicta meaning "Unconquered Rome" and is the motto of the county of Kent, England





He liked to climb the highest mountains as he tried to reach the sky, And though he never did quite make it, he was still prepared to try. His cycling had been first class; the 'Tour de France' his major aim. All his hopes for that have gone now, but his ambitions still remain. He also liked to run in marathons, where he'd run until he dropped, Now, he only runs in mind and spirit; since some ability has stopped. But he still dreams of those activities as he recalls when they began, Until that roadside bomb took both his legs, serving in Afghanistan. He'd still like to swim the longest rivers and swim every deepest sea, But his prostheses aren't yet motorised the way they'd need to be. Wounded service men and women who'd been giving us protection As they lost so very much themselves; heroes all, without exception. With great pride we will support them in each Invictus sporting test, The first three still get the medals, but all contestants are 'The Best'.



The Invictus Games is an international adaptive multi-sport event, created by Prince Harry, in which wounded, injured or sick armed services personnel and their associated veterans take part in sports including wheelchair basketball, sitting volleyball, and indoor rowing.






Volunteer Morning Tea


> Liz is also a valued TLH board member and respected identity in the local community.
