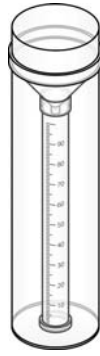
It is great to be here, and I look forward to many fruitful times with you all.

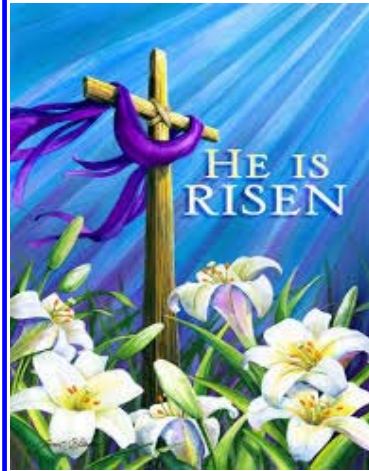

From the CEO



Go the Crows – at the writing of this article we await the outcome of the first women's AFL grand final. On Thursday 23 March 2017 the AFL season started – are you in the footy tipping – Sean tells me we have 55 people competing this year. If you have any advice regarding who win when, please share with me, I need all the help I can muster. Hoping for a year of the Crows. Apologies in advance for the Port Power supporters.

So now with the Home Care industry being deregulated it means that if you are receiving care via a home care package you have the right to choose who provides the care. If you are needing advice there are ways to get it – check on line, talk to others who are receiving care – come and talk to our staff – we will help to ensure you are being well looked after. If you need some support at home please request a review. Again, this can happen over the phone, on line or by organising someone to come and visit you. Better to ask and then receive than go without. The facility had an unplanned visit from the Accreditation Surveyors early in March. They spent time reviewing the Human Resource policies & procedures, the clinical processes, management of pain and the medication system. It is pleasing to report we met the outcomes tested without any recommendations. This indicates that Tanunda Lutheran Home has processes in place that are robust and clearly shows we are continuously improving in all areas of the home. I happily invite everyone to continue to provide feedback via the Compliments & Complaint Forms that are readily available.

Over the past weeks the TLH Board Members have been involved in Governance training and a Lutheran Church wide Governance Review. The church has instigated a national review of all aged and community services governance processes. This involves reviewing the Constitutions, Board Policies, Board Meeting Agenda and Board meeting outcomes. It is great to report that the Board has good policies and is achieving the outcomes that has Tanunda Lutheran Home moving forward in a very fast changing aged care industry.

It has been nice to see Ian Lutze—Chaplain—settle in to his new role here at TLH. We have also been very lucky to have Rob Hutchinson commence in the role of Hotel Services Manager (he is also a very good Chef).

Project up dates:

25 Bridge Street Project – there has been a handover date suggested of the 4 April 2017. The final touches are being completed – I can report we are very happy with how the building works have occurred. The last hurdle to get over is the connection of the power – this will not occur until later in April 17 due to workload of SA Power Networks.

Schaedel Street, Nuriootpa Project - Construction and Tender documentation for Stage One which includes the Community Centre continues and will be provided to the Barossa Council in the very near future.

27 Bridge Street Master Plan - Stage One - The concept plan has been agreed by the TLH Board and the Development documentation is now being completed to be put to the Barossa Council in the first week of April 17.

27 Bridge Street Master Plan – If you know of any community group that may be interested in hearing the story or seeing the power point presentation I have prepared regarding the 30 Year Vision please let me know who to contact. It is hoped in the not too distant future that a model of the Master Plan will be available for all to see.

We continue to farewell staff and welcome new staff and volunteers. We hope all the new residents are settling in and feeling comfortable - if you have any ideas on how to improve things please let us know. Should you know of any staff who would like to work for us please get them to submit their resume to Kim Hahn.

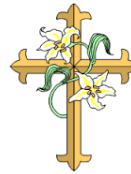

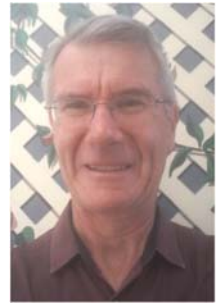

PROFILE

CHAPLAIN IAN LUTZE



I was born in Lobethal back in 1962, an 'effortless' birth my Dad informed me some weeks ago. This, together with the 'second child syndrome' meant I slipped under Mum's radar a bit, and tended to relate better to my Dad, a Spinner at the Onkaparinga plant in town. I loved being outdoors – gardening, growing cacti, collecting things, picking fruit, etc.

I was attracted to mines and minerals as a kid, especially when a mate and I discovered a long lost old gold mine shaft out the back of Lobethal. So it was a natural step to study Metallurgy at Uni. We Lutzes were also miners in Germany, and started life in Australia at Burra.

But after a year I switched to studying theology to become a pastor. After a fairly legalistic church upbringing I got really excited about God's radical grace at the Seminary, and was keen to ensure that nothing got in the way of people hearing and experiencing grace both inside and outside of the church. So my ministry involved chaplaincy stints as well as parish ministry duties. I probably was driven by wanting to ensure that Mum experienced grace too. That may even have been the biggest factor making me change from Metallurgy.

I married Vivienne halfway through the course, and even had our first child during the final year. Then we set out for the Hunter Valley in NSW, followed by Gosford and then North Adelaide. Then I was seconded by the Church to do five years as Ecumenical Co-ordinating Chaplain at the Repatriation General Hospital which, I suspect, was perfect preparation for where I am now (with you!). Carrying a bit of a German wartime cultural cringe I sometimes pinched myself what a welcoming community the veteran community at the Repat was.

Leading Remembrance Day last year with an Orion flyover was unforgettable.

Viv is a junior primary teacher at Prospect North Primary. We've been married nearly 33 years now, and have four children in varying stages of forming their own families and leaving home: Joel, Danielle, Samuel and Annika. We bought a house in Mansfield Park when the North Adelaide congregation felt they needed to sell their manse. This allowed me to work at the Repat, and is a great home base for all our current movements and responsibilities, including the relaxing commute to Tanunda.

I have some connections in the Barossa (predominantly as an appreciator of some of the product the Barossa produces). My mother was a St Kitts (later Bower) Wend, who was courted by Dad when she lived with her sister at Rosedale. So I'm a bit of an insider/outsider guy which has often been my greatest gift in ministry.

Thanks again for calling me, and I greatly look forward to these years ahead.

INSTALLATION OF CHAPLAIN IAN LUTZE

Sunday 26th March 2017

A spirit of joy and thankfulness was evident as our new Chaplain was officially installed by Bishop David Altus—even though he has been busily familiarising himself with his duties at TLH for some time. Pastor Ian has the daunting role of fulfilling each and every one of the 100 or more 'dot points' listed in his Letter of Call. Attached was also a four page job description.

We pray that he will be granted the wisdom, strength and commitment to meet these challenges.

Addressing the congregation of 108, Bishop Altus first acknowledged the wonderful contribution by Dianne Thiele who endeared herself to the TLH community while capably filling the role of Interim Chaplain following the retirement of Pastor John Thiel.

Bishop Altus based his address on the well known and much loved 23rd Psalm—the Good Shepherd Psalm. He explained that God is the Good Shepherd and that the word 'pastor' means 'shepherd' — so Pastor Ian is an 'under-Shepherd' of the Good Shepherd, Jesus Christ.

Bishop Altus said that Psalm 23 is a simplified version of the job description and we can't go past that. He expounded each verse of this Psalm in turn, each one bringing comfort and encouragement and the life giving water of God's Word—only God can renew and refresh souls.

Bishop Altus reminded the congregation that ageing can bring fears and regrets—and our chaplain is here to help us all through these hard times with God's life-giving message.

Morning tea was enjoyed afterwards in the Social Centre.



Prayer: Heavenly Father we thank you for appointing Ian Lutze as a steward of your holy mysteries and for giving him to this Home as our chaplain. Fill him with your Holy Spirit so that he may tenderly care for your people and give of himself to them. Help him to proclaim the gospel clearly and lead your people boldly. 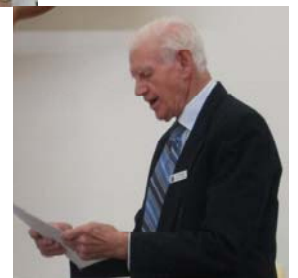
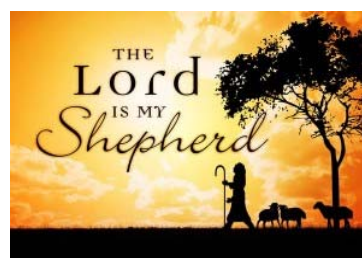

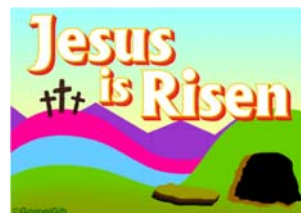
